# Introducing... Jackie Fetner Recipient of 2017 Hannah G. Solomon Award

This, in a nutshell, is why Jackie Fetner is Peninsula Section's honoree for NCJW's prestigious award. lackie has accumulated a diversified collection of hats. Beginning in the NCJW Evening Branch over 40 years ago, (the training ground for young women as future Section leaders), she was invited onto the Section Board and quickly rose to Executive Vice President. She earned that position having first served in various roles which included Associate Treasurer. As Exec. VP, Jackie became involved with the Thrift Shop.

It was a smooth transition into Peninsula Section where she further honed her leadership skills and was elected President when Section celebrated its 60th anniversary. Gathering additional experience, she then served on the National Board for six years and Asst. National Secretary for three years. Jackie is currently an Honorary National Board Member.

Active once more in Peninsula Section, she is presently on the Advisory Board, chair of Strategic Planning, and also chair of Long Island Sections.

Growing up in Brooklyn, Jackie was self-confident as a young child and always felt she could do anything. She was never afraid to try something new. Her grandparents were role models and involved in her life. Entering Brooklyn College at 16, she double majored in Speech and Psychology, met her future husband Mark, and married a week after graduation. Her first job was a sixth grade teacher. She earned her Master's Degree while working as a speech therapist. Jackie and Mark bought a house in East Rockaway in 1974 a few weeks after the birth of their twins, Rachel and Howie, and live there to this day.

Jackie and Raela Bloom were walking in Cedarhurst one day where they met an old friend who insisted they join NCJW. In Evening Branch, members convened in each others' homes and lackie learned from all the people she met. She attended training sessions and went to Washington. It was a heady time of expanding horizons and meeting well known speakers from all areas of public life. She collected friends from across the country through her activity on the Peninsula and National Boards.

As Jackie finished her presidency at Peninsula Section, she received an offer to return to speech therapy. At the same time she was invited onto the NCJW National Board which meets twice a year. National also offered periodic training sessions on membership. Jackie started work part-time

and adjusted her schedule to fit this all in. As well as a licensed teacher, she is also a certified speech therapist. She frequently comments that she has led a "charmed life". She is grateful for the "fabulous people" she has met and the help she received from them all. During every step of the way she had people teaching her - by example and per conversation. Jackie learned from others and recognized their skills. "It was quite amazing!" she said. Her NCJW involvement is a source of personal satisfaction and great joy. The wonderful women she met and best friends she made are the icing on the cake.

Jackie is proud of her family's connection to NCIW. Her Mom, still a role model, volunteered at

the Thrift Shop as did her children. Husband Mark, retired, was a TV director at WABC-TV. Her brother Marty is a generous supporter. "We are a team." Daughter Rachel is an endocrinologist and son Howie is an attorney following in his grandfather's footsteps. Daughter-in-law Meredith is also an M.D. Son-in-law Jeremy an attorney too. But the uncontested stars of the family are granddaughters Lily, Alexandra and Zoe.

lackie questions everything and regards her life as a process of trying to be a good person. To that end, always have hope and be patient. She feels strongly about honesty. Her advice to young people: "Find time to align yourself with organizations that share your beliefs and you will find a sisterhood and support system". It's not only that unexpected opportunities transpired along the way - but that she recognized them, made the decision to accept the challenges and arranged her life "to make them happen".

When asked what she would do if she had unlimited access to money and resources, she quickly responded: "A cook and a chauffeur". To which I added "Amen!"

# Peninsula Section's 80th Anniversary

The Bulletins throughout this 80th Anniversary Year have been featuring highlights of our various endeavors.



Advocacy is one strategy for effecting social change. It is the process by which the individual, and the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) as an organization, can speak up on behalf of current and vital issues. For 80 years, NCJW Peninsula Section has used its voice to make progressive social change. We advocate because we understand that elected officials are accountable to their constituents. We advocate because we are inspired by our Jewish values to repair the world – tikkun olam. We advocate because our history has taught us that our actions make a difference. NCJW advocacy positions are approved by the voting delegates

at the NCJW National Convention every three years. As Peninsula Section celebrates its 80th Anniversary, what follows represents but a few examples of our advocacy involvement throughout the decades.

### 1940 - 1950

- Assists in reuniting thousands of displaced persons with family members through the Port and Dock Department.
- ◆ Participates in the Ship-a-Box program sending toys, books, and educational materials to young Holocaust survivors and generations of Israeli children.

### 1950 - 1960

- Supports the "Freedom Campaign" to protect civil liberties during the McCarthy era.
- Supports the development of a Mealson-Wheels program in key states across the country.





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# 1960 - 1970

- Supports the establishment of the Research Institute for Innovation in Education (RIFIE) at Hebrew University in Jerusalem to assist at-risk children from all segments of Israeli society.
- Promotes voter education and registration following the passage of the Voting Rights Act.

### 1970 - 1980

- ◆ Marches for the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA).
- Celebrates the Roe vs. Wade decision protecting women's reproductive rights.



# 1980 - 1990

- Supports the Home Instruction Program for Pre-School Youngsters (HIPPY). By 1999, HIPPY USA had 121 programs in 28 states.
- ◆ Supports the NCJW Center for the Child to research children's issues and impact public policy.

### 1990 - 2000

- Advocates for women, children and families with increasing frequency and impact at state legislatures and Washington.
- Members sign on to NCJW's action alert network, to broadcast breaking news and legislative information on vital initiatives via e-mail, enabling instant action across the country.

### 2000 - 2009

- NCJW's BenchMark Campaign educates and mobilizes our members to promote a federal bench with judges who support fundamental freedoms, including a woman's right to reproductive choice. In 2004, Peninsula Section recruits high school students to attend the March for Women's Lives in Washington, D.C. in support of the Roe v. Wade decision.
- ◆ Advocates for Plan A, NCJW's campaign for women's access to contraceptive information and health services. In 2008, Peninsula Section trains 25 teen advocates in comprehensive sexuality education

and presents the Section's Plan A activities at the Chicago Convention.

- Supports the Israel Granting Program that addresses Israeli women's rights in economics, politics, education, domestic violence and social justice.
- ◆ In 2006, Peninsula Section earns the Innovation Award at the Chicago Leadership Conference for its ground-breaking Advocacy Film Series.

### **2010 - PRESENT**

- ◆ Educates members about Higher Ground, NCJW's Domestic Violence Campaign that promotes progressive policy solutions which advance women's economic independence.
- Advocates for Reproductive Choice Campaign to save reproductive rights. Responds to legislation which would impose funding
  and restrictions on women's health services.
- Members of Peninsula Section travel to Albany to defend reproductive rights in New York State.
- Peninsula Section recruits and trains teens to be grassroots advocates, our Generation Next. These teens attended Washington Institute, NCJW's premier advocacy event, and presented NCJW positions to their legislators.
- ◆ For the NCJW Promote the Vote Protect the Vote Campaign, Peninsula members provided voter education and registration information during the 2016 campaign.
- ◆ Through BenchMark, NCJW's judicial campaign sent a message to the U.S. Senate to #Do Your Job by providing a hearing for Merrick Garland Supreme Court nominee and to fill vacant seats in the federal courts.
- Educates our members and the community about NCJW's Anti-Sex Trafficking Initiative. We call upon Congress through policy
  and legislation to target traffickers and urge recognition for the needs of the victims.
- Peninsula Section builds awareness of human trafficking through the use of the cardboard life-size "teens." They tell the stories of young people victimized by traffickers.
- Through our visits to the Human Trafficking Court, the section bears witness to an innovative program for trafficked women who have turned their lives around, reducing or erasing their sentences.
- ◆ This year, Peninsula Section again highlighted the need for the passage of the ERA, America's "unfinished business," when we screened *Equal Means Equal* at the Hewlett-Woodmere Public Library.

For 80 years, NCJW Peninsula Section's advocacy work reflects the spirit of the organization – a powerful union of forward thinking ideals and Jewish values. Peninsula Section's role has and will continue to be the support of our progressive values. As the recent election results indicate, not only does our work matter, it is more important than ever before!





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After 80 years, with so many changes in the world, Peninsula Section remains a vital force for progressive social justice. As officers, board and committee members, and volunteers, we have all played a part in this history. We share in the pride of what we have accomplished together and how we have enriched the lives of so many. With renewed commitment and dedication, Peninsula Section's legacy will continue to be an inspiration for years to come!

### 1940s -

In the 1940's, Peninsula Section established the Dental Clinic and Golden Age Club, reaching out to community school children and seniors.

### 1950s —

In the 1950's, membership grew to 1,000 and we began study groups, institutes and workshops.

### 1960s -

In the 1960's, volunteers began to meet more community needs at PENT, Vision Screening, and the 5 Towns Child Care Center. In 1968 the Thrift Shop moved to 340 Central Ave., Lawrence.

### 1970s -

In the 1970's, ESL, Campership, and Families in Transition were added to the Community Service department.

### 1980s —

In the 1980's, Central Avenue became our new home with an expanded Thrift Shop and office. We bought our first of many computers and created New Generation.

### 1990s —

In the 1990's, we held our first Women's Health Forum, and Advocacy focused on women, children and families.

### 2000s

In the 2000's, our presidents were Joan P. Ivler, Raela Bloom, Joan Riegel, Robin Ivler, Abby Fox, Sally Telias and Pnina Knopf. Benchmark, Plan A and Higher Ground were launched by NCJW, creating advocacy opportunities for Peninsula Section. We were excited to collaborate with the Cedarhurst Village to finance and build a universally accessible playground in Cedarhurst Park. Through the sale of Israel Granting tribute cards, we began the tradition of partnering with grass roots organizations in Israel fostering knowledge and women's empowerment. Mia Farrow, Joy Behar and Hillary Clinton, Alan Dershowitz, and James Carvelle kept us informed.

### 2010s -

In the 2010's our presidents were Abby Fox, Carole Tolkin, Bonnie Sperry, Laurie Stone Brofsky, and now currently Judi Braverman. The Thrift Shop, cornerstone of all Peninsula Section's source of funds, underwent major renovations. The retail and inventory space was reconfigured and given a total makeover. The Back 2 School Store was introduced and now in its 5th year, has become a major success story, serving well over 500 children and their families. Our Universally Accessible Playground in the heart of Cedarhurst was rededicated in celebration of its 15th anniversary. Advocacy efforts grew tremendously. A new group, Generation Next, composed of high school students emerged. They too became advocates adding their voices to many issues. Highlights have been Day of the Girl, Anti-Trafficking, the Affordable Care Act, Promote and Protect the Vote, Benchmark, Sexual Assault and Anti-Semitism on College Campuses, and Immigration Reform. Our Advocacy Film Series, touching on all initiatives, have been tremendously successful and well received. #Giving Tuesday, Shopping Boutiques, Home & Garden Tours, Shop Smart, Game Day and Florida Theatre Parties all contributed to our fundraising coffers. Carol Bellamy, Mike Farrell, Jenna Bush Hager, Liz Murray, Amy Powers with Lucy Simon and the story of the Monuments Men kept us all informed.



### Peninsula Section Honors SUNYA KLEINER

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**The cream always rises to the top** is a fitting summary of **Sunya Kleiner**, honoree of Long Island Sections, Peninsula as **A Woman Who Makes a Difference**. Low-keyed and unassuming, Sunya's inner compass is focused on helping others. Community Services provided the outlet for her "people involvement." Her journey along this route included stops as a volunteer in many services that honed her sensitivity to the needs of different populations.

Upon joining **NCJW**, she initially volunteered for **Campership** which introduced her to the rewards of helping children experience a life changing activity. She then moved on to the **Mailing Committee** and other office related activities. Needing more people involvement, Sunya became **Co-chair of the** 

Lecture Series for several years, and eventually joined the NCJW Peninsula Board. Serving in this capacity informed her

of the range of services offered. English as a New Language (ENL) and Special Tutorial Educational Program (STEP) showed her the results of individual tutorial help. SIBSPLACE provided a calm refuge for siblings and parents of children with catastrophic illness, and Intergenerational Reading Program mutually benefitted two different age populations. She oversaw the Knitting Program where volunteers created lap blankets for children in hospitals, and was active in the Center for Adult Learning and Enrichment (CALE) as well as Court Advocacy where volunteers are trained to be advocates for clients. Last, but not least, her hands-on involvement at the Back 2 School Store completed her apprenticeship that culminated in her rise as Vice President of Community Services for three years.

The ground work leading to this pinnacle was her background of four years in merchandising as assistant and then buyer in Stern's Dept. Store, which was followed with thirty years as an elementary school teacher. During this "Training Period", Sunya was active in B'nai Brith which she joined "to help our people everywhere" and eventually rose to President of her unit. Not allowing the grass grow under her feet, she was a committee member of the Community Arts Council of the South Shore, and served as Vice

President. As filler for some "spare time", Sunya volunteered at the Helen Keller Services where she helped to transcribe hundreds of educational materials to a large print format for children. Topping off her need to give back, she is on the Board of the Valley Stream Jewish Center.

Sunya earned a BA from Hunter College and MA from Hofstra University. She is the proud mother of Jay and Susan and grandmother of Brenden, Kirsten and Steven.







The Jewish Film Festival was started 38 years ago by Frances Buratt, past NCJW Peninsula Section board member, in memory of her husband William. Helen Pollack and her late husband Irving were also involved in promoting old Jewish films. Helen has continued to expanded the program presenting films with Jewish content.

(R-90 min) A romantic film adapted and directed by Joan Micklin Silver. Stars Carol Kane, Steven Keats and Paul Freed-

man. Kane was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress. Based on a 1896 novella "Yekl: A Tale of the New York Ghetto".

### May 8 – Rosenstrasse



(R-136 min) A 2003 film dealing with the Rosenstrasse non-violent protest taking place in Berlin during the winter of 1943, carried out by non-Jewish ("Aryan") wives and rel-

atives of Jewish men arrested for deportation. These protests escalated until the men were released. This was a significant instance of opposition to the events of the Holocaust.

### May 15 – The Flat



(R-97 min) A spell-binding Israeli documentary film about family secrets where the director, Arnon Goldfinger, joins his mother in cleaning out the Tel Aviv flat

that belonged to his grandparents. This film has won numerous awards for documentary, including one from the Tribeca Film Festival (2012).
