


Program Meeting MEET JOSHUA M. GREENE

Award Winning Author, Filmmaker and Lecturer

TUESDAY, MARCH 20, 12:00 NOON

TOPIC: "Justice at Dachau, The Trials of an American Prosecutor"



The world remembers Nuremberg, where a handful of Nazi policymakers were brought to justice, but nearly forgotten are the proceedings at Dachau. In "Justice at Dachau," Joshua M. Greene recreates the Dachau trials based on thousands of pages of transcripts, and reveals the dramatic story of William Denson, a soft-spoken, inexperienced young lawyer from Alabama whisked away from teaching law at West Point to lead the prosecution in the largest series of war crimes trials in history.

Joshua M. Greene is an author, documentary filmmaker and frequent speaker on war crimes trials and Holocaust witness testimony. Mr. Greene spent thirteen years in Hindu ashrams before returning to America in 1982, when he was appointed Senior Vice President for Global Affairs at Ruder-Finn, an international communications firm working at the intersection of business and corporate social responsibility. In 2000, he was chosen to serve as Director of Strategic Planning for the United Nations Peace Summit of Religious and Spiritual leaders, and since then he has lectured on war crimes and the law at the Pentagon, the Judge Advocates College, and State Bar Associations nationwide. The American Bar Association has just released his book *Justice at Dachau* in a paperback edition. We are pleased that Professor Greene, a long-time resident of Lawrence, is with us today.

In addition to teaching and writing, Dr. Buultjens lectures at the 92nd Street Y and CW Post. He is well-prepared, thought provoking and exceedingly fair-minded. His views are based on scholarship, not opinions or prejudices.

#MeToo Movement: Why Women Now Feel Empowered

For a long time most women defined their own sexual harassment and assault as something unspoken, something private, something to be ashamed of acknowledging. Silence, although understandable, has its cost. When women come forward with allegations of sexual abuse and harassment, the woman is often the person blamed and not believed.

Tarana Burke started the MeToo movement more than a decade ago, inspired by a young girl who confided she had been sexually abused. Recently, #MeToo has become a rallying cry after accusations of misconduct against many high profile men in film,

media, politics and other industries with some fired from their posts. The actress Alyssa Milano brought the hashtag #MeToo into the spotlight. Her tweet urging victims of sexual abuse to share their stories and show their solidarity under the hashtag #MeToo quickly went viral. It received nearly 40,000 replies and 30,000 likes in less than 24 hours.

The goal of the #MeToo movement is simply to give people a sense of the magnitude of the problem. Men are also appalled by what the #MeToo movement has uncovered. Social Media is the heart of the change filled with an endless stream of people proclaiming "me too." The more people who come forward and say "me too" the less stigmatizing the label.

Time magazine named "The Silence Breakers" of the #MeToo movement as 2017 *Person of the Year*. The selection is determined by the person or persons who most influenced the events of the year. "The Silence Breakers" represent thousands of people across the world who have come forward with their stories of sexual harassment and assault.

The power of the #MeToo movement and "The Silence Breakers" is that it takes something that women have long kept quiet and transforms it into a movement. It is an attempt to get people to understand the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault in society – a problem once "a given" in the fabric of a woman's experience.

Advocacy Film Series: "Birthright: A War Story"

This eye-opening documentary is much more than a rehash of the still unsettled argument about reproductive rights. It is a stunningly shocking look at where we are now, 45 years after Roe v. Wade legalized abortions – how the anti-abortion movement has quietly and stealthily, state-by-state, restriction-by-restriction, chipped away at a woman's constitutional right to decide when, how, or whether to bear a child. Who makes a decision about her health, rights, or choices? The state? The courts? Religious doctrine? AND, as her healthcare options and choices erode, a woman may even find herself criminalized in the process!!!

Our Facilitator: Dr. Schmidt, has extensive experience with abortion restrictions and TRAP (Targeted Regulation of Abortion Providers) laws in several states, and will lead us in the discussion with a Q&A following the film.

The Many Faces of Sexual Harassment

Sexual assault can happen to anyone, anywhere, and at any time. It knows no age, gender, or socioeconomic boundaries. One of the many goals of **NCJW Peninsula Section** is to raise awareness and educate our community about sexual harassment, and to give a voice to the voiceless. In a series of articles, "The Many Faces of Sexual Harassment" will be describing different types of sexual assault, and where to find help.

What is Sexual Harassment?

Harvey Weinstein, Kevin Spacey, Roy Moore, Al Franken, Bill Clinton, Matt Lauer and Donald Trump have all been accused of being sexual harassers. Some of these men have been fired, others are being investigated, and still others have held, or are holding, high positions in our Government. But how is sexual harassment defined?

Sexual Harassment can occur in the workplace or learning environment, such as a school or university. It can happen in many different scenarios, including afterhours conversations, exchanges in the hallways, and non-office settings with employees or peers. According to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical harassment of a sexual nature in the workplace or learning environment. Some forms of sexual harassment include:

- Making conditions of employment dependent on sexual favors
- Physical acts of sexual assault
- Requests for sexual favors
- Verbal harassment of a sexual nature
- Unwanted touching or physical contact
- Unwelcome sexual advances.

You might also encounter sexually harassing behaviors outside of school or work. Catcalling, being followed, sexual advances, groping, people exposing themselves, and other unwelcome or threatening behaviors qualify as sexual harassment. (RAINN.org)

Stalking is also a type of sexual harassment and is defined as a course of conduct directed at a specific person that places a reasonable person in fear for her or his safety. It is against the law in every state. Stalking across state lines or in federal territories is illegal under federal law as well. (Central MN Sexual Assault Center)

Sexual Violence/Rape

Sexual violence is any type of unwanted sexual contact. This can include words and actions of a sexual nature against a person's will and without their consent. A person may use force, manipulation or coercion to commit sexual violence. These acts may be perpetrated against children, teens, adult and senior citizens. Those who sexually abuse may be an acquaintance, family members, trusted individuals or strangers.

One of the most important facts to remember is that victims are NEVER to blame. It does not matter what someone is wearing, or how they are acting. An absence of injuries to the victim does not in any way imply consent.

- Stranger assault: This assault is usually a one incident occurrence. It is an assault by someone you have never met before. This assault almost always involves a certain degree of violence.
- Drug facilitated rape: This usually occurs when you are at a party, club or social event. An abuser may drop a drug such as a
 roofie or ecstasy in a drink. You may experience drowsiness, confusion, impaired judgement and reduced levels of consciousness.
 Often, these drugs cause memory loss, and the victim will not remember what has occurred or who assaulted them.
- **Spousal or marital rape:** Sexual acts committed without consent and against a person's will. This type of rape is very underreported as there is a fear of reprisal by a spouse or the threat of loss of one's children.





SIBS Place

JUDIE HOROWITZ – Chair

There are moments that shout THIS is why we need SIBSPlace. They can be heartwarming and heartbreaking at the same time. This is one I just have to share with you.

Since SIBS expanded to include children who have a parent with cancer, we have experienced loss. When this happens, our staff of mental health social workers bring all the children together to discuss how the affected child might feel when he or she returns to our group and what they might want to say (or not say) and especially how we will greet them and what we might say.



Michael*, 11 and Joey*, 8 lost their mother. A month later, Anthony*, 6 lost his father. When Anthony came back to SIBS we all expressed our sympathy and told him how pleased we were to have him back, as we had done with Michael and Joey. Then 11 year old Michael said "I just want you to know that we are all here for you and we always will be." Then he continued "And I want you to know that sometimes you feel like crying and that's OK. Everyone feels that way sometimes and it's OK to cry – even if you're a boy."

Yes, SIBS kids are comfortable with things no one their age should ever know.

For those unfamiliar with SIBSPlace, it is a free support program for well children in families where another sibling has a catastrophic or terminal illness or a parent has cancer. The kids range in age from 5 through 17. Through art therapy, age-appropriate games and skillfully guided conversation, they develop coping skills, compassion, empathy and immense emotional wisdom. There is also a support group for parents and a bereavement group for our children and others. NCJW can be proud that they have been with us on this important journey from the beginning. We are so grateful for your support.


Crossing Delancey

"I Am Malala" by Malala Yousafzai

The Girl Who Stood Up for Education and Was Shot by the Taliban


