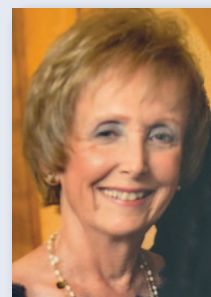

Susan came to NCJW Peninsula Section following her retirement from teaching. Susan taught third/fourth grade in the Oceanside School District for 28 years. Her desire to help children began early on. At eight years of age her dance class was performing for handicapped children; unexpectedly and surprisingly she knew what she wanted to do with her future. Helping others in need became one of her goals and this choice was confirmed by her association with a wonderful sixth grade teacher who encouraged her to believe in herself and know that she could do anything she put her heart into.

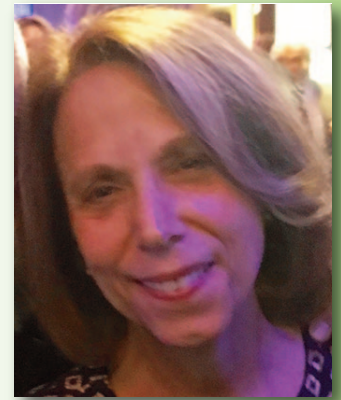
As a teenager, Susan began to realize her goal of helping children and worked as a counselor at a summer day camp. She continued to work with children in high school as a youth group leader as well as a music director for another student group. Undeniably, she was an organizer and innovator . . . but, wait! There's more! During college, she was determined to extend her understanding of the needs of young people, so she became a psychiatric occupational therapist. Also in college, she was a volunteer with AHRC, which brought her in contact with people who had developmental disabilities. Though Susan enjoyed working and helping people as an occupational therapist, she longed to make that special connection with children and earned her teaching license.

As a teacher, Susan went above and beyond. She used her many talents to lead several school musical performances. Susan was never satisfied with the status quo and always looked to improve her own skills, as well as those of her students, which led her to write new curricula and advocate for changes within her school. Susan's bent toward leadership led her to create model lessons for other teachers and to supervise student-teachers. Knowing she had made a difference in so many children's lives, it was time to retire.

Her journey continues. As a retiree, Susan still had the drive to help others. She became a member of NCJW, joined the Board of Directors and has quickly made a difference. Steadfast in her love of helping children, Susan co-chaired the Back 2 School Store which served over 600 children this summer alone. She was instrumental in developing our new website add and now manages and updates it as our webmaster. Susan attended the NCJW Leadership Retreat, continuing her love of learning and leading.

Shelly, her husband, whom she met working as a counselor at HANC Day Camp, couldn't be prouder of all of Susan's accomplishments. Jeffrey, her older son, a lawyer, works with Shelly on real estate management. Elliot, her younger son, who is very generous and a giving soul, works in digital marketing. Susan recently became the proud grandmother to Freddie Duke.

Voting is the cornerstone of our democracy. As a tax-exempt organization, NCJW encourages civic engagement without supporting or opposing any candidate. Election Day 2018 is Tuesday, Nov. 6th. On that day, we will cast our vote for Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, U.S. Senator, Representatives in Congress, State Senator, Member of Assembly, and Judges.

And they, in turn, will affect many issues, policies, and rights that are essential to members of NCJW, the organization that leads the progressive Jewish community on several key issues of concern. The stakes have never been higher. Your vote has never been more important.

◆ **Safeguard Reproductive Health and Rights** including contraception, abortion, annual exams, cancer screening and age-appropriate sex education in public schools. NCJW has rallied with other groups (eg. Planned Parenthood) to achieve success in the implementation of women's health benefits in the Affordable Care Act.

◆ **Ensure Civil Rights and Civil Liberties** with a fair and independent judiciary, promoting religious freedom and strengthening the separation between religion and state.

BENCHMARK: NCJW's Campaign to Save Roe v. Wade has vigorously opposed judicial nominees who threaten our fundamental rights, and will continue to do so in the coming years with future nominees to the Supreme Court.

◆ **Advance the Well-being of Women, Children and Families** through laws that encourage self-sufficiency through economic improvement, a healthcare system that works for all Americans, and an end to violence against women.

Family Court Advocacy Program – Volunteers Needed

RHONA GOLDMAN – Chair, Family Court Advocacy Program

The Family Court Advocacy Program is one of the many arms of the Safe Center LI (formerly Coalition Against Domestic Violence).

Advocates are constantly involved with men and women who are in crisis. The courts can be intimidating to a person who has never been in the presence of a judge. Often, the person comes to court and has little or no support system. The experience can be overwhelming, but if there is an Advocate, one who can listen, offer information about the courtroom procedure or merely be a physical being sitting next to a distraught person, it can be tremendously helpful.

The Advocate helps the person have a voice. She tells the client what to expect when he or she appears before the judge. There is no preponderance of any color, race, religion or political persuasion. There are young people, married people, elderly people, couples living together and same sex couples in the courtroom. All should be treated equally under the law.

Working in Family Court is a privilege and an honor. It can reaffirm your sense of justice and the search for truth. NO EXPERIENCE NEEDED – JUST A KIND HEART. If you are interested in becoming an Advocate in this program, please contact Rhona Goldman at 516-599-2719.

NCJW Takes a Stand on Gun Violence

FERN LAMBROZA – VP, Advocacy

The United States has higher rates of gun violence than any other developed nation in the world, with 33,000 individuals killed every year by guns. The proliferation of, and easy access to guns has resulted in an epidemic of gun violence — from deadly domestic abuse to suicide and school shootings.

Support for the Second Amendment goes hand-in-hand with keeping guns away from criminals and other dangerous people. Common-sense public safety laws, requiring gun buyers to pass a criminal background check, closing the private sale loophole; banning military-style assault weapons and high-capacity magazines; criminalizing gun trafficking; and eliminating loopholes that allow convicted stalkers and domestic abusers access to guns, can reduce gun violence and save lives.

NCJW believes that the nation's laws and policies should restrict and regulate guns to prevent gun violence. NCJW supports limiting the sale and distribution of firearms, in order to reduce the number of lives cut short and families destroyed.

LISA WINJUM is vice-president of external affairs for the Joyful Heart Foundation, founded by Mariska Hargarty, to help sexual assault survivors heal and reclaim a sense of joy in their lives.



As Joyful Heart's Vice President of External Affairs, Lisa leads the organization's education and awareness portfolio, as well as its communications, marketing, and digital fundraising. She has more than 15 years experience in public affairs, government relations, and fundraising. Lisa came to Joyful Heart from Planned

Parenthood Hudson Peconic (PPHP) and the PPHP Action Fund, where she served as its Vice President of Public Affairs, overseeing public policy, advocacy, political affairs, and communications. She has extensive experience working around the issue of sexual assault. Prior to joining PPHP, she was the Director of Public Policy and Advocacy for the Connecticut Sexual Assault Crisis Services. From 2007 to 2013, she served on the board of the New York State Coalition Against Sexual Assault, completing a two-year term as its president in 2013. Lisa holds a juris doctor degree from Quinnipiac University School of Law.



NATASHA SIMONE ALEXENKO is the founder and CEO of Natasha's Justice Project (NJP), created to expose and eliminate the nationwide rape-kit backlog and to bring justice to survivors of sexual assault.



Natasha Simone Alexenko was violently raped and robbed at gunpoint in New York City in 1993. It took nearly 10 years for her rape kit to be tested and another several years before her attacker was finally apprehended. She's recently written a memoir, "A Survivor's Journey: From Victim to Advocate",

which recounts not only the attack and the effects it has had on her life, but also her advocacy work and what led her to start her foundation.

Natasha founded Natasha's Justice Project in 2011 and is a consultant for the Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI), where she works with law enforcement officials, prosecutors, and rape crisis center staff on techniques to properly support victims and process kits. Natasha's story was featured in the HBO documentary, "Sex Crimes Unit".

Along with her partner Scott and their dog Piper, Natasha lives on Long Island.

The 2018 Back 2 School (B2SS) store is now behind us and we have begun to work on the 7th annual B2SS to be held in July of 2019. More than 111,000 children under 18 live in poverty in Nassau County. Bikes, Butterflies and SIBSPlace

SIBSPlace offers so much. I'd like as many people as possible to be aware of us in case they know of someone who can benefit from our services. I've seen what a difference SIBSPlace can make in the children who attend and learn skills to cope with the difficult family situation they are in when a family member has a catastrophic illness. I've also seen how the parents bond and support each other as they share this new and uncharted journey.

SIBSPlace is a free therapeutic program that serves the well children (ages 5-17) in a family with a seriously ill sibling or a parent with cancer. It also offers a parent support group and a bereavement program.

The following is typical of so many of the heartwarming/heartbreaking moments at SIBS.

This story has more impact when it comes from Dan. He's a big man and very athletic, so when he tears up, you notice. Dan is into bicycles and, fortunately, into SIBSPlace as well. He arranged a bike day for our kids. Fun, outdoors, safe trails for those who could, bikes to borrow for those who needed and – especially important – instructions for beginners. Melody was "just almost" ready to take off on her own and, after some help from Dan, she did. When she came back from doing the circle all on her own she was glowing. Dan expected the megawatt smile. He's seen his magic work before, but he didn't expect all the excited talk about the butterflies. "Yes," he said, "I saw them too." "But did you see them around ME? All around me! Helping me!"

That's when Melody's dad came forward and gave her a special hug. Through tears and smiles he explained that when Melody's mom was dying, with the help and support of the SIBSPlace Parent Group, she was able to explain to her daughters that she would be leaving them. Her way of promising them that, although gone, she would never abandon them, was to tell them to look for butterflies. Whenever they saw them, she told the girls, it would be her watching over them.

You'll never convince Melody – or Dan – that it wasn't Nancy who taught Melody how to ride that bike. (names were changed to protect privacy)
