When we speak of everything we do and of our wonderful programs, we are really speaking about all of our dedicated volunteers. We are a volunteer organization, and without you, our volunteers, there would be no programs or services. In your desire to help others, you are making our world a better place. Some volunteer in one of our many community services or in the Thrift Shop. Some are on our leadership team, providing guidance and direction in a Board or Off Board position. Some serve on a committee or chair an event or program in the advocacy, community services, education, fundraising, or membership department. Each person makes an impact on the lives of the women, children, and families in our community.

Under the leadership of volunteer chairwomen, and in cooperation with professional agencies in the Five Towns and surrounding communities, we take action and provide funds for vital community services. In addition to the financial support we provide to CALE, the Center for Adult Life Enrichment, and the Five Towns Early Learning Center, we also provide them with volunteers and enrichment programs. Our volunteers go into the local schools and help students with and without special needs in the Special Tutorial Education (STEP), English as a New Language, and Intergenerational Reading programs. We also go into local pre-schools to provide dental and vision screening to identify undetected problems early and to inform parents about them. Other volunteers help at SULAM-LI and SIBSPlace. In our court advocacy program, volunteers work with people in crisis and offer a support system, information, and assistance. Our knitting program volunteers have made hundreds of lap robes and blankets which have been donated to local hospitals and child care centers. Each year, our Back 2 School Store is staffed by just under 300 volunteers.

NCJW Peninsula Section volunteers are an amazing group of thinkers and doers. I am awed by the dedicated and hard-working women and men who devote themselves to improving the lives of those around them by sharing their talents and skills and by how much we contribute to the community by our actions. THANK YOU for being part of NCIW Peninsula Section, for your commitment and dedication, for giving freely of your time and energy, and for enabling us to achieve so much.

Women's March Alliance 2019

With increasing reports of anti-Semitism at the helm of one of the giants in the women's movement: the Women's March, NCJW, Inc., NCJW Peninsula Section, as well as many other Jewish organizations did not support or participate in the Women's March. New Yorkers fortunately had the option of standing behind the Women's March Alliance. Thousands came together on West 72nd St. and Central Park West, and marched for justice for all people; women, men, Jews, Muslims, Immigrants as well as the LBGTQ community. Notwithstanding the remarks of its leaders, the Women's March movement and, specifically, the Unity Principles of the Women's March organization, which we at NCJW were instrumental in helping to draft both in 2017 and 2019, are in complete alignment with NCJW's Principles and Resolutions. Changes we recommended have been adopted, including adding the names of Jewish women to the list of feminist leaders (Bella Abzug and Hannah G. Solomon) and adding "Jewish women" as a vulnerable population in 2019. We have been working with March leaders to ensure that the March agenda includes an explicit rejection of anti-Semitism.

Gun Violence Prevention Forum

"The shooting at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh is a sad and frightening reminder that the forces of antisemitism and hate are alive and threatening," said the Holocaust Memorial and Tolerance Center of Nassau County. On October 30, on a beautifully crisp evening I attended a vigil at the Oceanside Veterans Triangle for the victims of this hate filled crime. I remember asking myself "when will this end?" Will it ever end? I lit a candle, stood with the others at the vigil and listened to political speeches. I then went home and had a good cry. And then, I resolved myself to be proactive and make a difference.

- 2016 Pulse Nightclub 49 killed

- ◆ 2018 Tree of Life Synagogue 11 killed
- 2018 Las Vegas Mandalay Bay killed

Town of Hempstead Supervisor Laura Gillen is a Nassau County native from Baldwin and the mother of four children. Ms. Gillen has had a passion for serving others from a very early age, when she would regularly volunteer at South Nassau Communities Hospital and Camp Anchor.

Her interest in public service ripened while a student at Georgetown University, where she concentrated her studies in government. At Georgetown, Ms. Gillen participated in the Baker Scholar program, which impacted the direction of her life profoundly with its focus on community service. After graduating cum laude, Ms. Gillen returned to New York to study at Stella Adler Studio. She later became an agent for a leading speakers bureau. During these years, Ms. Gillen was also a GMHC volunteer, assisting persons living with

HIV/AIDS and later embarked on transformational visits to destinations in China, Southeast Asia, the Middle East and India. The focal point of her travel was an extended volunteer mission in Calcutta with Missionaries of Charity, where she worked in Mother Teresa's home for the dying.

Afterwards, Ms. Gillen returned to Georgetown for law studies at night while also interning for Hon. Marian Blank Horn of the U.S. Court of Federal Claims by day. It was here where her passion for the law blossomed. Eventually, Ms.

Gillen would take on securities regulation, defamation, employment and intellectual property cases, while also volunteering her time to assist victims of domestic abuse.

Ms Gillen currently resides in Rockville Centre with her husband and their children. She is a member of the Nassau County Bar Association and a parishioner of St. Agnes Cathedral, where she serves as a catechist.

October: Gun Violence Prevention in cooperation with Hewlett-East Rockaway Jewish Centre and Temple Am Echad

Our speakers, Nicole Hockley and Jeff Kasky, experienced the effects of gun violence first hand, and have made it their mission to turn tragedy into action. Since Nicole Hockley's six year old son, Dylan, was killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School, she has had one key mission: to make sure that no other parent experiences such a loss. She founded Sandy Hook Promise, which focuses on preventing gun violence by teaching how to recognize the signs of people at risk of hurting themselves or others.

Jeff Kasky is the president of Families vs. Assault Rifles and the father of two Marjory Stoneman Douglas students who were present for, and survived the mass shooting at their school. One of his sons, Cameron, is the founder of the March for Our Lives Movement. Inspired by his son and his friends, he and other parents founded a super pac to fight for common sense gun regulations.

November: Stopping Serial Rapists

Sexual assault is a terrible crime. But it's even more terrible when the victim has done all the right things and still has not received justice because her rape kit has been stored and ignored for almost ten years. This is what happened to Natasha Alexenko, but instead of remaining a victim, she became an advocate, Natasha is the founder and CEO of Natasha's Justice Project, created to expose and eliminate the nationwide rape kit backlog and to bring justice to survivors of sexual assault like herself. To learn more, read her memoir, "A Survivor's Journey".

The Joyful Heart Foundation, founded by Mariska Hargitay, was represented by Lisa Winjum. She told the story of how Ms. Hargitay, because of her work on Law and Order SVU, became involved with Joyful Heart, and produced the film "I Am Evidence", which will be shown at the Hewlett-Woodmere library on March 10.

International Council of Jewish Women (ICJW)

JUDY MINTZ - ICIW Main Representative to UN Headquarters in NY



ICJW is an umbrella organization with 37 affiliates on five continents. Established in 1912 it, too, was foundeded by Hannah G. Solomon with a mission to "promote a just society based on human rights and Jewish values". Each member affiliate fulfills the ICIW promise in its own unique way. As members of NCIW Peninsula Section we each belong to this international organization. NCJW USA is the largest and oldest affiliate.

In May of 2018 at the quadrennial convention in Australia, the delegate body passed five resolutions of current concern and areas for action-reaffirming the importance of the UN's

16 Sustainable Development Goals, helping to eliminate the use of textbooks which teach hate in Palestinian schools, opposing Holocaust denial, condemning the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions Movement (BDS), and approving abortion reform. The standing committees reflect the priorities of the organization: the status of women, anti-Semitism and racism, the environment, lewish education, interfaith and intercultural activities, community service, NGO observer status at the UN in NYC, Geneva, Paris and Vienna, and representation at the World Jewish Congress, the Council of Europe and ICAR (International Coalition on Agunah Rights).

Twice a year the ICJW executive committee comes together. The members represent their affiliate and share reports about their individual assignments, best practices and concerns. This fall 40 women from 14 different countries met in Paris. We gathered from France, Finland, the United Kingdom, Sweden, Mexico, Belgium, Switzerland, Poland, Uruguay, Greece, Australia, South Africa, Israel, the Czech Republic and the United States. It's such a privilege to hear accomplishments and share ideas and to make friends with Jewish women from around the world. The agenda included the importance of including the other and the continuing rise of anti-Semitism. A most meaningful picture of the group was taken for inclusion on WJC's website. It was of our group with the sign: #We Are With You Pittsburgh.






"A Tale of Love and Darkness" by Amos Oz

Amos Oz was a writer, journalist and professor. He was born in Israel in 1939 to Polish immigrants. He left home for a kibbutz when he was 13 and changed his surname from Klausner to the Oz meaning "courage" in Hebrew. Oz' mother suffered from depression and committed suicide when he was twelve. Her illness and ultimate suicide is explored in "A Tale of Love and Darkness". Oz wrote a number of books and is considered a leading Israeli thinker. He was a proponent of the two-state solution.
