



> Lecture Series planned for this year. There will be four lectures based on the topic of Long Island. Broadway has been open for some time and we



SPEAKER: AWARD WINNING **AUTHOR TALIA CARNER**



Fleeing poverty, strife and pogroms of Eastern Europe in the late 1800s and early 1900s, over 150,000 Jewish girls who dreamed of "America" fell to the false promises of marriages and jobs by members of Zwi Migdal. Instead, this legal traffickers' union that operated with impunity throughout South America for 70 years, forced them into prostitution. Talia will reveal how the cries of these women, also shunned by the Jewish community, forced her to expose the most shameful chapter in Jewish history. She will also educate the audience about actions that can be taken today to abolish the horror of modern human enslavement in your own backyard.



Next Program Meeting: The Art of Storytelling and Disarmament Education to Counter Nuclear Threats

Guest speaker Dr. Kathleen Sullivan has been engaged in the nuclear issue for more than 30 years. Director of Hibakusha Stories, an education initiative that has brought atomic bomb survivors (hibakusha) to some 45,000 students, she produces nuclear themed films and projects that focus on art for disarmament. With the United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs, she developed the disarmament education web portal.

Washington Institute 2022 Recap

DONNA BIALOR – Advocacy

If you want to understand what makes NCIW such a powerful and respected organization, you need to experience NCJW in action at Washington Institute.

On May 15, 2022, NCJW leaders and advocates from Sections across the country and from Israel met in person in Washington, D.C. I was honored to attend this year's Institute with Peninsula Section President Myra Garber and Section Administrator Bonnie Sperry. I was awed by the work that went into making this meeting an invaluable learning tool for maximizing our advocacy efforts. The theme this year was Leading Together, emphasizing the heightened power of individuals and organizations working in concert to reach shared goals.

The schedule for our 3 days together combined General Sessions, where everyone gathered to hear panel discussions and keynote speakers; breakout sessions devoted to the nuts and bolts of getting the job done; and time for schmoozing with and learning from NCJW leaders from around the country – an outstanding group of women!

Our National Leaders Sheila Katz, NCIW's CEO, and Dana Gershon, NCIW President, inspired us with their vision of what we could achieve together. We heard from politicians like Representatives Debbie Wasserman Schultz, Gerald Nadler and Kathy Manning and Senator Richard Blumenthal. We listened to Kristin Clarke, Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights speak on the importance of continuing to press this issue through legislation and in the courts. Deborah Lipstadt, the recently-appointed U.S. State Department Special Envoy charged with monitoring and combatting antisemitism, explained the importance of her work. Ukrainian Ambassador to the U.S., Oksana Markarova, praised NCJW for our ongoing support of her country. She received a standing ovation.

Faith leaders across the rabbinic spectrum – from traditional to decidedly nontraditional – gave us their perspective on the intersection of faith and advocacy. Exec-

utive Directors and founders of organizations such as Mom's Rising, a gun control advocacy group; The Jews of Color Initiative; and the National Partnership for Women and Families praised the leadership and work of NCJW.

It was especially encouraging to hear from young women and men who have started new grass roots organizations such as

Several things stood out:

- ♦ The devotion of NCIW's national leadership to advancing the causes we support you could feel it in the passion of their advocacy
- ♦ The respect that NCJW has as a leader in the non-profit advocacy arena – the excellent key-note speakers, panel members, breakout leaders and politicians who participated in the Institute were a testament to that.

Renee Bracey Sherman, the founder of We Testify, an organization dedicated to helping women share their abortion stories.

We also spent time in small groups learning successful advocacy strategies from NCJW national staff and trainers from other grassroots advocacy organizations. The energy in these sessions was contagious.

The culmination of the Institute was the Rally for Abortion Justice convened by NCJW and cosponsored by Hadassah. The thousand or so people gathered on the lawn in front of the Capitol heard an amazing array of politicians; faith leaders - and not just Rabbis; abortion justice advocates; and some ordinary people with a poignant story to share; raise their voices together in support of religious freedom and the right to control our own bodies. It was a truly moving experience.

I am so proud to be a part of National Council of Jewish Women!

The International Day of the Girl

Since October 11, 2012, Peninsula Section's Generation Next's teens, the younger group of NCJW Peninsula Section, have celebrated and advocated for the Day of the Girl. The Day of the Girl Child is an international observance day declared by the United Nations to recognize the marginalization of young women throughout the world by such injustices as breast ironing, genital mutilation, impaired or no education.

In the spirit of "Day," this years' teens, Sophia Gilleeney and Benjamin Tsukerman, Hewlett H.S. students, wrote letters to their legislators asking them to proclaim the day. Lest we in the United States feel complacent, with the recent Supreme Court decision to overturn of Roe v. Wade, the urgency of their message could not have been more timely as the pair recognized the injustices girls face in the United States, as well as throughout the globe (surely, the pair argued, the rape of a poor white Mississippi twelve-year old is as impactful as her parallel in any third-world country). The pair's letters of appeal for support went to their congressional and state and local leaders. At this writing, Sophia and Benjamin have received proclamations from State Senator Todd Kaminsky and Congresswoman Kathleen Rice.

On their return to school, Sophia and Benjamin plan to mount a campaign to involve business leaders and organizations as well as their school peers in recognition of the importance of the day, noting that strong, proud and healthy girls are the prerequisite to strong families.

We are all going to get old...if we are lucky! The alternative is surely unacceptable.

"Acting Our Age" is an engagingly insightful film about that process. Through the eyes of six women, ages 65-75, we are given some fresh, new perspectives on aging. The emotionally charged subjects of shifting body image, family life, death, and sexuality are considered.

Though our hearts and minds may still be creative, productive, and eager, society often typecasts women in less than desirable roles. Females, as opposed to males, are more quickly labeled with age-related stereotypes from aesthetics and physical ability to personal achievement and fashion choices. Already facing discrimination in many arenas, women are thus victimized again by ageism, a weapon to be used against them. The film offers a reframing of ageing, a time of immense freedom and liberation, unshackled by old expectations and ways of thinking.

Director/Producer: This is Israeli-born Michal Aviad's first movie for which she received several prizes. It was presented in several festivals to critical acclaim and broadcast in the prestigious documentary POV (Point-of-View) slot on PBS.

On Thursday, April 28, Yom HaShoah, (Holocaust Remembrance Day) 950 middle and high school students from across Long Island, joined NCJW Peninsula Section on Zoom, to view a special presentation of the Documentary "The Barn".

Rachel Kastner, the film's producer, joined us from Israel to show her documentary and answer the students' questions. She also spoke about storytelling and intergenerational responsibility to remember the Holocaust.

The students' strong reactions to this experience were evident by the questions they asked such as:

- "How do we prevent these things from happening in the future?"
- "What was your grandfather's life like after the Holocaust?"
- "What can we do to support people who survived the Holocaust?"

And then came the thank you notes addressed: "Dear Rachel and Grandpa Karl"...

ff Thank you so much for sharing your struggle and journey through the Holocaust as well as after it. It was interesting to hear how you deal with your past. Personally, I think it would be hard to disconnect most of your emotions with the trauma you faced. It is astonishing to hear the accomplishments you made after your immigration into the United States like with your studies at Columbia. Even with such a "disadvantage" you still persevered and came out successful. I love how you said that you only focus your emotions on the future and stop dwelling on the past.

🌃 Thank you so much for sharing your story with my class. When listening to you after the film I found it so inspiring how motivated you are to spread your grandfather's story to educate others. Your film and Q&A left me thinking about how I could help Holocaust survivors and help to prevent anything like the Holocaust from happening in the future.

NCJW Peninsula Section and Rachel Kastner, hopes to bring this experience to more students, and others, in the future.


