NCJW held their first in person program meeting in over two and one half years on September 29, 2022. It was wonderful to once again see our members and guests enjoying the afternoon and the wonderful program presented by author, speaker Talia Carner. From our speaker we learned the shocking history of over 150,000 young Jewish girls who were forced into prostitution in Buenos Aires between the late eighteen

hundreds and World War II. These young women were lured into prostitution by promises of marriage and going to America, only to find themselves abused and sold into prostitution.

Unfortunately, sex -trafficking did not end there, but continues in our country today. Globally an estimated twenty five million people are subjected to human trafficking and forced labor. Long Island is among the top 20 jurisdictions nationwide impacted by human trafficking. Victims are often addicted to drugs by the traffickers to keep them in prostitution. They are physically abused and held captive and every aspect of their lives is controlled much like the young women of Buenos Aires. We must remain vigilant for signs in people that might indicate they are subjected to inhumane treatment. As members of NCJW we strive for social justice by improving the quality of life for women, children and families by safeguarding individual rights and freedom.

If you suspect that someone is being subjected to abuse of any kind do not intervene, call 911 instead. What we do as individuals can make a difference.

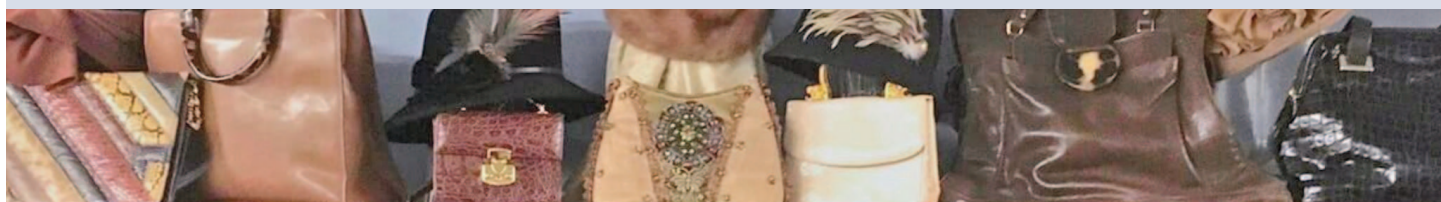

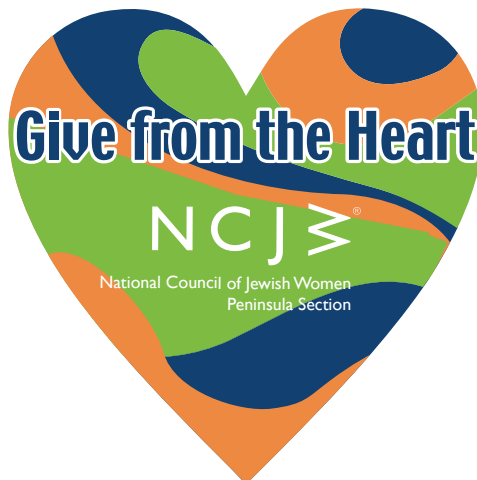
Dr. Kathleen Sullivan

Dr. Kathleen Sullivan has been engaged in the nuclear issue for more than 30 years. Director of Hibakusha Stories, an education initiative that has brought atomic bomb survivors (hibakusha) to some 45,000 students, she produces nuclear themed films and projects that focus on art for disarmament. With the United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs, she developed the disarmament education web portal for the UN's Cyberschoolbus website and co-wrote Action for Disarmament: 10 Things You Can Do! In 2007, Kathleen was commissioned by the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (2017 Nobel Peace Laureate) to produce the campaign's first education material for high school and early college students. She has supported hibakusha inclusion in international conferences and UN fora that preceded the adoption of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. Kathleen is a Nagasaki Peace Correspondent and Hiroshima Peace Ambassador.

Advocacy, It's What We Do

CAROLE TOLKIN – VP, Advocacy, and DONNA BIALOR – Advocacy Coordinator

There are so many important rights at stake in our country today – the right to vote, the right to have control over your own body, the right to keep your religion and government separate, the right to be respected regardless of who you are and what you believe. That's why, more than ever, we need advocates.

Our Advocacy committee is working on three issues today:

- 1. Voting Rights.** On October 6, at our Thrift Shop, Donna Bialor and a colleague were successful in registering people to vote.
- 2. Abortion Rights.** On October 27, at Temple Sinai of Roslyn, the Advocacy Committee presented the first of a three part series on Abortion Justice. The second of the series will be on Thursday, December 15, and will focus on the medical implications of Roe v Wade, as well as New York Section's Pro-Truth Campaign, which takes a look at fake abortion clinics. The last of the series, on February 9, will feature a dialogue between two rabbis on the Jewish view on abortion. In addition, one of our members will give testimony about her illegal abortion. All sessions will be live streamed.
- 3. Equity and Inclusion Rights.** Our Diversity, Equity and Inclusion chair, Pnina Knopf has planned a Board and staff training led by a professional facilitator. This will begin in November.

And lastly, in the light of increasing antisemitism on college campuses, we are working on showing "The Barn" to college students. If you have any contacts with local universities, please let us know. Advocacy is everyone's job. Please let us know if you have an issue that you would like to work on with us.

Advocacy/Education Film Series at the Hewlett-Woodmere Public Library

Acting Our Age

Sunday, November 13 at 2:00 pm on Zoom

"Acting Our Age" is an engagingly insightful film about that process. Through the eyes of six women, ages 65-75, we are given some fresh, new perspectives on aging. The emotionally charged subjects of shifting body image, family life, death, and sexuality are considered. Though our hearts and minds may still be creative, productive, and eager, society often typecasts women in less than desirable roles. Females, as opposed to males, are more quickly labeled with age-related stereotypes from aesthetics and physical ability to personal achievement and fashion choices. Already facing discrimination in many arenas, women are thus victimized again by ageism, a weapon to be used against them. The film offers a reframing of ageing, a time of immense freedom and liberation, unshackled by old expectations and ways of thinking.

Director/Producer, Michal Aviad. This is Aviad's first movie for which she received several prizes. It was presented in several festivals to critical acclaim and was the first to be broadcast in the prestigious documentary POV slot on PBS.

Facilitator, Linda Sapadin, Ph.D. is a psychologist who specializes in helping people overcome self-defeating patterns of behavior, particularly debilitating fear and chronic procrastination. Dr. Sapadin has been honored with "Fellow" status by the American Psychological Assoc., an indication that her work has an international impact on the field of psychology. She is the author of 6 self-help books and her work has been featured in *The New York Times*, *USA Today*, and *The Washington Post*.

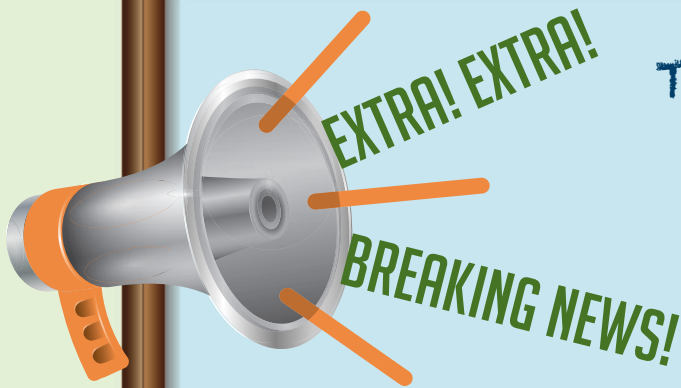

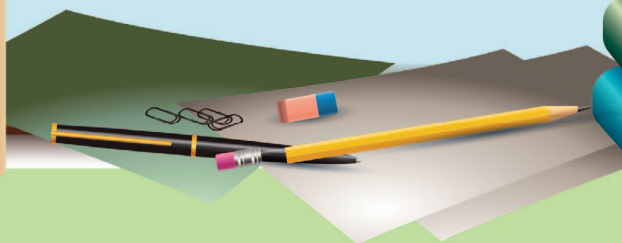
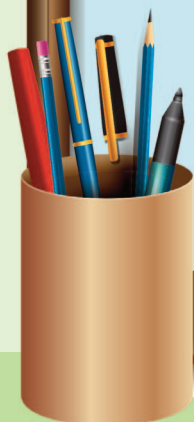
