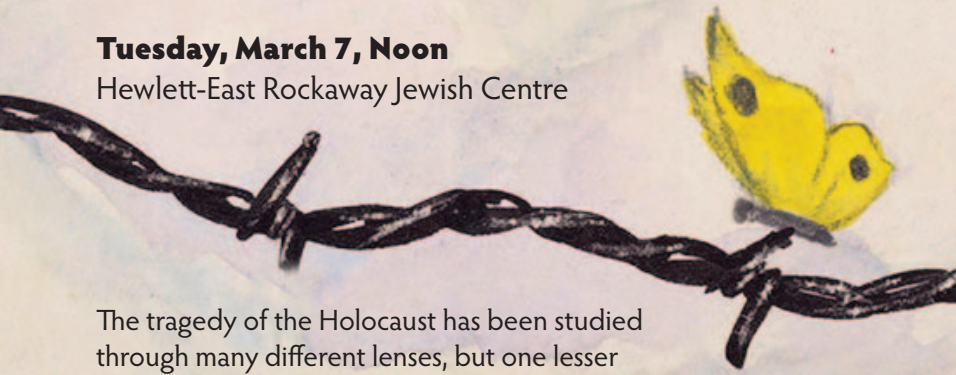

Recently NCJW Presidents from all around the country have communicated their concerns and fears about the rising incidents of antisemitism in their states. Nationally reported anti-Semitic incidents in 2021 reached an all-time high. NYC has the highest reported anti-Semitic incidents across the United States. In Nassau County anti-Semitic incidents have increased. Many Jewish families received packets of anti-Semitic flyers as well as flyers scattered across their lawns containing negative statements about Jewish media, bankers, medical professionals and government officials, blaming them for everything that is wrong with our country. These flyers were meant to harass and alarm the families who received them. Our children and grandchildren have to fight antisemitism on college campuses instead of using their precious time for learning.

It doesn't end with antisemitism but falls to other communities. There is a rise in hate crimes against African Americans, Latinos, Asians and the LGBTQIA's communities.

The board of NCJW Peninsula Section is eager and committed to collaborate with community leaders of all faiths to address these issues and come together as one to fight discrimination of any kind.

An old adage tells us if you have a need for a project to be completed to perfection in a designated time; you give it to a busy person. That defines our 2023 Founder's Day Honoree, Susan Fox.

Susan originally lived in Queens and moved to North Woodmere when she was five years old. After graduating from Hewlett High School she attended Utica College of Syracuse and majored in Occupational Therapy. A caring and giving person by nature, Susan volunteered at a local AHRC working with people with developmental disabilities.

Her working career began as an Occupational Therapist at Hillside Psychiatric Hospital, a part of Long Island Jewish Hospital. Susan then completed a Masters' Degree Program at Hofstra University in Elementary Education, and became an elementary school teacher in the Oceanside School District. In addition to teaching for 28 years, she was a student teacher advisor, a writer of curriculum, an instructor of teacher and parent workshops, and directed the school's musicals.

Both Abby Fox and Pnina Knopf encouraged Susan to become involved in NCJW. She soon understood the work they accomplished, and how many lives were touched in a positive way, all ample reasons which she says, to become a member.

The first community service project Susan undertook was chairing the Cell Phone Program. Cell phones were collected and programed to call only 911. They were donated to victims of domestic violence. In addition, Susan had her classroom students decorate 'Care Kits' bags that were filled with toiletries that were distributed at a local shelter. She saw the importance of teaching her students the value of community service and doing for others.

Upon retiring from teaching, Susan joined the board of Peninsula Section. Then followed an array of leadership roles in a multitude of areas of the organization, such as: Chairperson of the Back 2 School Store, a committee to redesign and upgrade our website, becoming our "web master" and the creator of our Constant Contact messages. She is now Vice President of the Thrift Shop which she says she truly enjoys as she gets to see how important the store is to the underserved population and the lovers of "the treasure hunt" for special items.

Susan has also taken the time to serve on important committees including advocacy, building renovation, strategic planning and nominations. You can understand why she was presented with the Emerging Leader Award.

With all these many activities, this extremely busy lady enjoys working on puzzles, playing the piano, improving her computer skills, and creating new cooking recipes. Susan is passionate about our environment, women's rights, and for providing for those in need of support.

Susan and husband Shelly have been married 48 years. They met when they were counselors at HANC Day Camp while they were in college. Shelly supports everything Susan does and is always there for her to lean on. Susan says she is very lucky to have found such an amazing man. They are the proud parents of two sons. Advocacy Update

Our Jewish values compel us to support full access to safe and legal abortion. Therefore, Peninsula Section in collaboration with Temple Sinai of Roslyn, presented a three part series on Reproductive Rights. The first segment highlighted legal issues with keynote speaker Susan Herman. Representing NCJW was Lauren Garfunkel.

The second segment focused on NY Section's Pro Truth campaign, as well as the medical implications following the overthrow of Roe v Wade.

The third segment featured a dialogue between two rabbis speaking about the Jewish view of abortion, and the very personal story of a victim of an illegal abortion.

Another program, "THE BARN", which chronicles the story of a Holocaust survivor and his return to the barn in which he was hidden, was shown to students throughout the country. Thank you Pnina!

In light of the increase in all types of hate, the Advocacy Committee is setting the groundwork for a 2023–24 series on Building Bridges, Building Community. Anti-Semitism will certainly hold an important place in this series, as well as other forms of hate, all of which are intertwined.

Intergenerational Reading Program is Back in Full Swing

The Intergenerational Reading Program runs once a week at Dever Elementary School in Valley Stream. The students come from ethnically diverse backgrounds. Running for 2-1/4 hours on Mondays, it meets from October through April. The 10 volunteers, all seniors, met the first day and spoke about their backgrounds with the librarian and PTA members.

We work with first through fourth grade students. The children gave up half of their

recess period to participate. They read with us for twenty-five minute sessions. I noted that the students were quite proficient in reading skills for their grade levels (I'm a former teacher). There are two children at a time at my table and together we read a book of their choice. In addition to reading we chat about our lives. The children enthusiastically tell me about their parents, siblings, and experiences. I really enjoy conversing with these lovely children. A PTA staffer told me that the kids really like me, and I replied that it was mutual. This wonderful experience has invigorated me! I look forward to my weekly visits.

The Period.Project

Did you know that several states provide funding for feminine hygiene products to be readily available in schools, but N.Y. State does not?

Many students do not attend school when they have their period because they cannot afford to purchase feminine hygiene products. No student should have to miss a day of school because they can't afford these items.

Our newest community service, The Period.Project, has already delivered over 500 'kits' of feminine hygiene products to three schools and we are getting ready to pack more. We gathered around a table, talked, laughed and filled over 500 cosmetic bags with sanitary pads and tampons. The bags were delivered to Freeport High School, Lawrence Middle School and Valley Stream South High School.

Presenter Rich Quinlan, Director of the Holocaust and Genocide Education Center at St. Elizabeth University.

The tragedy of the Holocaust has been analyzed and studied through many different lenses, but one lesser discussed topic is the art created by camp prisoners, ranging from simple pencil sketches to more detailed graffiti. Learn about the art created by camp prisoners capturing the strength and spirit of those condemned by the Nazis. Attendees will gain a greater perspective on how art allowed concentration camp prisoners to preserve their humanity in the midst of dehumanizing conditions.

Originally from Providence, Rhode Island, Rich Quinlan spent twenty-six years as a classroom teacher. Rich has earned three master's degrees in Secondary English Education, Political Science, and American and Modern European History from Long Island University. In 2019, Rich joined the staff of Mercy College in the Bronx as adjunct professor of both American and Modern European History. Rich graduated in August 2021 with a Ph.D. in Holocaust and Genocide Studies from Gratz College in Pennsylvania. His dissertation addressed the need for transitional justice and reconciliation in post-genocide Burundi. He is currently the Director of the Holocaust and Genocide Education Center at St. Elizabeth University. His personal and professional life was transformed by his participation in the summer of 2015 with the fortunate involvement with the Holocaust and Jewish Resistance Teachers Program organized through the American Gathering of Holocaust Survivors and their Descendants. Rich was one of twenty-four teachers selected from across the U.S. to spend two weeks touring Germany and Poland, gaining a greater understanding of the causes, implementation, and lasting ramifications of the Holocaust.

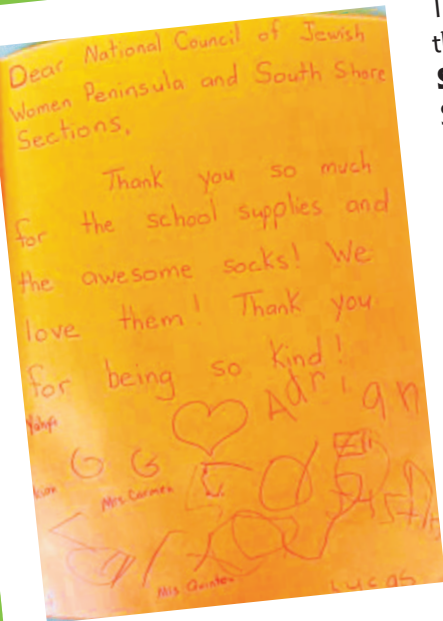

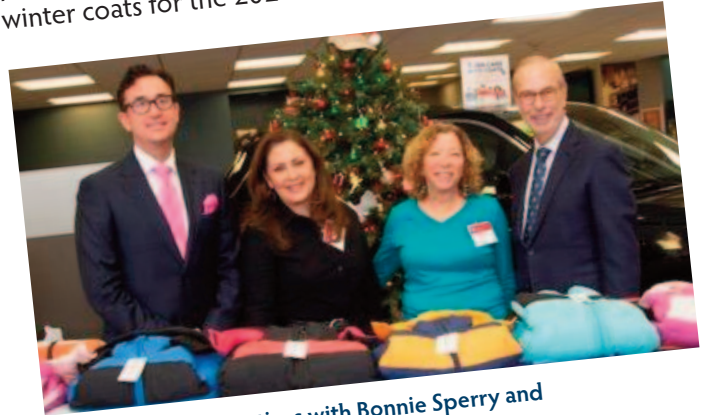

No Way Out But One

Sunday, April 16 at 2:00 pm

I imagine that, like me, you find the phrase Family Court reassuring. The words "family" and "court" suggest a reassuring coziness that justice will be served. **WRONG!**

No Way Out But One is the riveting story of Holly Collins, a domestic violence victim and the first American to be granted asylum by the Dutch courts. Holly's story exposes the shockingly ugly truth about our national scandal, the family court system where family court justices frequently give custody to abusive fathers. Holly takes the only way out: she kidnaps her children and runs. It's a heartbreaking story that needs to be seen as it focuses the spotlight on a situation that must be understood to be rectified. Producers Garland Walier and Barry Nolan earned numerous awards for their inspirational and compelling documentary.

Facilitator: Teri Yuan. Teri Yuan is a survivor, a feminist business consultant, and founder of the Engendered Collective, a platform for survivors, practitioners, and allies to connect in community, learning, and advocacy through the radical inquiry of patriarchy. Teri hosts the weekly podcast, en(gender)ed, which explores the systems, practices and policies that enable gender-based violence and oppression and offers solutions to end it.

ICJW Executive Board Meeting – Making Strides Worldwide

Bi-annually the International Council of Jewish Women's (ICJW)s Executive Committee comes together to meet as a board to share information, learn best practices, make organizational decisions, and to provide the opportunity to create bonds with other like-minded women from around the world. The November meeting achieved these goals and I was privileged to have been there to participate, to learn and to make friends.

The two-day meeting was called to order by president Lilian Grinberg from Mexico. The agenda included briefings on Anti-Semitism by Alan Ronkin, Washington director of the AJC and on Aging in Women by Silvia Perel-Levine, past chair of the NGO Committee on Aging in Geneva. Additional agenda items were adoption of a statement on aging and a definition of Anti-Semitism, financial presentations, and proposals to the ICJW constitution, UN reports from NY and Geneva, and the status of women in Jewish law including the Agunot.

ICJW is located in 34 countries along with their affiliates on 5 continents. NCJW USA is the largest. All members of NCJW belong to ICJW. From the past six months reports were submitted describing activities and programs. There are common themes and similarities. This is only a small sampling:

- ◆ Esther's House Association in **Budapest** held trainings about fighting discrimination and how to protect diversity.
- ◆ The **Czech** Council of Jewish Women held a conference on "Women's Empowerment-Strength, Courage and Solidarity" with participants from Slovakia, Poland, Hungary and refugees from the Ukraine.
- ◆ The Women of Federation of **Mexico** is an umbrella organization representing 52 separate groups—including sisterhoods, schools, Wizo, and NA'AMAT—and has projects that help refugees from Ukraine, children with disabilities, addicts and the elderly. They supply food to the hungry and wedding gowns to brides.
- ◆ The Council of Jewish Women (CJW) in **New Zealand** has focused on climate change.
- ◆ In **Slovakia** there are programs on Holocaust observance and remembrance.
- ◆ National Council of Jewish Women **Canada** (NCJWC) has 5 sections and works with groups that have been impacted by discrimination, domestic violence, and human rights violations.
- ◆ The Council of Women's Organizations in **Israel** (CWOI) works to highlight gender disparities, women in business, ageism, women's roles in securing peace and security, and the inclusion of women in political parties.
- ◆ The **Swiss** Union of Jewish Women during Covid supplied food and social support for refugee women from the Ukraine.
- ◆ Red de Mujeres Judias **Argentinas** empowered the work of female scientists, singers and writers.
- ◆ The League of Jewish Women in **Great Britain** (London and Manchester) celebrated Human Rights Day, organized a book club, supported women who have lost their hair, and marked the passing of the Queen.
- ◆ Members from **Belgium** are concerned about climate change, equal pay for women and men, LGBTQ rights, the homeless, Anti-Semitism (Deborah Lipstadt spoke), and violence against women.
- ◆ In **Costa Rica** the emphasis was on gender violence and elder home care.

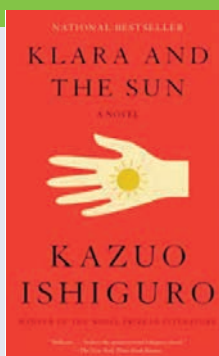
