Message from the President

Welcome to the November December issue of NCJW Peninsula Section's Bulletin.

On Saturday October 7, 2023 as the Jews in Israel were concluding the seven day festival of Sukkot, Hamas had something else in mind. Without warning, missiles rained down from the sky on indiscriminate targets along the southern border of Israel, leaving hundreds of bodies in the streets and destroying homes and buildings. As this occurred, Hamas troops charged into cities brutally killing and raping at random innocent citizens including babies, children and the elderly; taking hundreds of hostages including American citizens back to Gaza.

The members of NCJW are outraged and heartbroken by these tragic events and stand in solidarity with the women, children and families of Israel.

EQUAL JUSTICE UNDER LAW

Equal Rights Amendment

Are you aware that the Equal Rights Amendment has still not become the law of the land?

Three years after the ratification of the 19th amendment, giving women the right to vote, the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was initially proposed in Congress in 1923 in an effort to secure full equality for women. It sought to end the legal distinctions between men and women in terms of divorce, property, employment, and other matters.

It was first proposed 100 years ago, by Alice Paul, at the National Women's Party in Seneca Falls, NY. It was a proposed amendment to the Constitution which stated, "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex." It had failed to achieve ratification by the 38 states by 1979, the limit set by Congress. However, it is not dead.

Many states have passed the law, codifying it in their constitutions. In 2022, Nevada became the 38th state to ratify it, which would allow the 28th Amendment to become part of the Constitution. The problem is the timeline has not yet been extended.

Rep. Ayanna Presley (D-MA) and Sen. Ben Cardin (D-MD) have introduced bills to remove the old timeline and recognize the ratification.

We need to urge our elected politicians to vote for the resolutions—HJR 25 in the House and SJR 4 in the Senate. Please contact your representatives to ask them to do so. In the meantime, you can take action yourself and sign the petition at **Sign4ERA.org**.
